

Dear Fellows of the Robert Bosch Academy,



Nearly two years into the pandemic, many people seem to have accepted life in a "new normal". We have learned to live with the presence and mutation of the virus: its restrictions on everyday life, the remote work, social distancing, hygienic precautions, and, of course, the vaccinations. At the same time, inequalities in vaccine distribution became visible with vaccination rates at more than 80 percent in some European countries while less than 2 percent in countries in Sub-Sahara Africa. These disparities will continue to present a global

challenge and variants of the SARS-CoV-2 virus will undercut vaccine effectiveness. Thus, the pandemic is not over yet, but there is light at the end of the tunnel. The Richard von Weizsäcker Forum 2021 reflects this balance of caution and optimism with a four-part digital event series and in-person Study Tour.

Located at the heart of the Europe, the SaarLorLux region – a portmanteau of Saarland, Lorraine, and Luxembourg - invites us to reflect on identity, culture, and democracy, not only through a national lens but with a transborder perspective. In this election year, we will discuss the issues important to voters and politicians at the regional and local level on all sides of the borders. Our tour will guide us to Luxembourg and France to explore the nature of transborder cultural identities, the impact of the European Union in the daily life of citizens there, and the character of the key multilateral agreements, as well as the tensions that inevitably arise among neighbors.





Digital Event Series: German experts and decisionmakers discuss implications of the 2021 Bundestag election

German political commentators describe 2021 as Superwahljahr, or super election year. It started with state elections in Baden-Wuerttemberg and Rhineland-Palatinate, local elections in Hesse in March, and then state elections in Saxony-Anhalt in June. As a grand finale, numerous elections happened in September: local elections in Lower Saxony, state elections in Berlin and Mecklenburg-Western Pomerania, and, of course, the federal election. The latter determined the composition of the new Bundestag and, hence, the chancellor of a post-Merkel Germany.

In a digital event series, the Richard von Weizsäcker Forum 2021 assembled a range of German experts and decisionmakers to discuss the implications of the Bundestag election on various policy fields with the fellow community. At the first event in June, fellows heard voices from a number of different sectors to gage the atmosphere in Germany 15 weeks before the vote. In September, shortly before the election, a second event offered fellows the opportunity to discuss party priorities and decisive topics of the campaigns with party representatives. After the election, fellows had the opportunity to attend a briefing on the results and their implications for Germany's next government. Finally, once a coalition agreement is reached and a new government is formed, a fourth panel will examine the priorities of the new German government.

SaarLorLux: a cultural and socio-economic lab for crossborder cooperation?

The border region of SaarLorLux is characterized by its common past in steel and coal mining, intercultural workplaces and crossborder commutes, multi-language artistic venues, and routine international encounters. Actors from arts and culture, large global corporations, and local and regional media contribute to the crossborder identities of the SaarLorLux population. This region was thus hardly a surprising choice when in 1985 the five European Community member states Germany, France, Belgium, the Netherlands, and Luxembourg came together to sign the seminal Schengen Agreement, a treaty that led to the creation of Europe's Schengen Area, in which internal border checks have largely been abolished.

Foreign Investments, Local Impact: How global actors shape the region's economy

In 1960, in the German federal state of Saarland, 125,000 workers were employed in the mining and steel industry. As a result of both the coal crisis in the 1960s and the 1970s steel crisis, employment in these sectors fell by more than a half. Joblessness rose to over 15 percent. Today, the very last remnants of the regional coal and steel industry are on the verge of disappearing completely.

As for automotive manufacturing, it surged in the 1970s and for decades thereafter. In 1970, Ford opened a plant in the city of Saarlouis, and subsequently many suppliers such as Bosch, Michelin, and the company ZF settled in Saarland. Yet today large parts of the classic automotive industry are ever more obsolete, which has hit the region hard again. The commitment to maintaining the region's international competitiveness however is strong. In addition to new foreign investors, economic development initiatives of the SaarLorLux region's businesses play a major role in its sustainable economic development.



Thomas Schuck, who holds a degree in industrial engineering, is Managing Director of SHS Strukturholding Saar GmbH and gwSaar Economic Promotion Corporation (SHS/gwSaar). There, he is responsible for cooperation with international investors in Saarland, gwSaar is a state-owned corporation for the promotion of the economy and offers services for investors, such as relocation management, business development, and support on real estate. One of the major recent projects of SHS/gwSaar is the successful cooperation with SVOLT,

a Chinese developer and producer of lithiumion batteries and battery systems for electric vehicles and energy storage systems.

Is All News Local? The fourth estate in the regional democratic order

A free press is fundamental for a functional democracy. Only on the basis of information that is not regulated by the state can citizens make independent decisions on political issues. This session will discuss how this applies to regional news organizations, especially in a border area that is characterized by a transborder community and strong regional identification.

Martin Grasmück is a journalist and since May 2021 director general of the Saarland public broadcasting service Saarländischer Rundfunk (SR). After having studied English, information science and political science at Saarbrücken University, he began his career at SR in 1999, first as a journalistic trainee in radio and TV. later as radio presenter. reporter and editor at SR 3 Saarlandwelle. Since 2008, he has had various leadership and administrative roles at SR. Before he was elected to be the service's director general, he was

deputy program director. He is an advocate for the importance of regional news and entered the job with a strong commitment to combat the chronic financial problems at SR, one of the smallest public broadcasting services in Germany. In a recent interview, he said on this issue: "There is a special strength in being rooted in the region. The SR is a piece of home, the SR creates identity, the SR is a bridge to France. We are one of the most popular institutions in the Bundesland".

Creating Cultural Identity in the Border Region

PERSPECTIVES is the only French-German cultural festival that provides a stage to French- and German-language theater productions. Originally devised as an experiment in 1978, it is now a 40-year success story of cross-cultural collaborations and encounters in the SaarLorLux region. It takes place in Saarbrücken, ideally located at the intersection of Germany, France, and Luxembourg, and attracts an audience of up to 30,000 people every year. The focus on French- and German-language content makes the festival a symbol of the *amitié franco-allemande*. This session will examine how arts and culture contribute to a transborder, cross-cultural identity among the people of the Saarl orl ux

Sylvie Hamard is the artistic director of the Festival PERSPECTIVES. She has held this position since 2007, when the festival was about to lose its main financial support due to a lack of public interest. Under her leadership and vision, which focused on opening the festival up to everyone, the audience numbers grew quickly, from 3,500 in 2006 to 12,000 in 2009 and to the record number of 40,000 in 2015. Apart from her position at PERSPECTIVES, Sylvie Hamard is a musical program producer at Château de Versailles

Spectacles, where the program includes opera, theater ballet and other events. She has worked at theaters in Paris, Berlin and the SaarLorLux region. Before her career in the arts, Sylvie Hamard studied biology. In 1991, she moved to Saarbrücken for her studies, and ended up living there for eleven years. She began working in arts and culture through an internship at PERSPECTIVES.

More than 30 years after the famous agreement was signed, "Schengen" today stands as a symbol for the freedom of movement and the abolition of border checks in large parts of Europe. Citizens of the 26-country Schengen area and holders of a Schengen Visa may cross borders between most EU states, and even some non-EU member states, like Switzerland, without passports. This administrative act proved the cornerstone for a Europe of open borders and a catalyst for European integration. In the SaarLorLux border region alone, hundreds of thousands of commuters, school-children, and public service providers cross the border every day. How closely the neighboring countries became connected became clear when, in the wake of the pandemic, the borders suddenly closed and large parts of life in the region came to a standstill. This session highlights the relevance of the Schengen Agreement to modern Europe and shows how much lies behind the appellation.




Martina Kneip has been the Director of the Centre Européen Schengen since 2007. She coordinates and executes educational activities and tours. She is a tourism professional, who graduated from university with a diploma as a tourism business economist. She worked as managing director of the tourist information in Breitnau and as a marketing assistant on the Irish tourist board. Before starting at the Centre Européen Schengen, she was the coordinator of the Industry and Railway park of Fond-de-Gras, which, until 1955, was one of the most important mining centers in Luxembourg and now is an open-air museum.

EU regions, EU law, and EU tensions:
Principles of the EU and a nuclear stress test

The EU is built on many principles: one of them is as a "community of law" with its own judiciary and the Luxembourg-based Court of Justice of the European Union (CJEU) at its core. The CJEU ensures the application of EU law. Another central EU principle is subsidiarity, which maintains that policy and governance affairs will only be addressed on the EU level when member states lack sufficient capacities to deal with them.

As a transnational region, SaarLorLux has been supported by the EU's Europe of the Regions framework to improve social and economic coherence among the region's citizens. Naturally, even though crossborder cooperation between Germany, France, Belgium, and Luxembourg has been increasing for decades, there are matters that sow conflict, such as nuclear energy. Stress tests occur wherever national approaches drift so far apart that they seem barely compatible – and nuclear policy is just one example.

Diverging Nuclear Policies and Civil Society Protest: The Cattenom nuclear power plant as stress test for the border region

The Cattenom nuclear power plant is located in northeastern France on the Moselle River, just 22 km from the city of Luxembourg and 48 km from Trier. The world's eighth-biggest nuclear power station has been operational since 1986 - and since then a source of contention. While Germany and Belgium are phasing out of their nuclear power programs (Luxembourg doesn't have one), France is still heavily dependent on nuclear power. In April 2021, Luxembourg and the German states of Saarland and Rhineland-Palatinate renewed their calls for France to close the Cattenom plant. As it sits on the border between the three countries, Luxembourg and Germany would be impacted directly and immediately by an accident releasing nuclear discharge. Currently, the French government is reviewing its nuclear policy. This session will discuss how the Cattenom plant has developed into a real stress test for the borderlands.



Roger Spautz is the co-founder of Greenpeace Luxembourg and has been a campaigner for Greenpeace since 1987. especially on nuclear issues. He was part of a Greenpeace activity in 2017 in which 15 environmentalists gained access to the Cattenom plant site and set off fireworks directly in front of the plant's spent fuel pool. The aim was to demonstrate how easy it is to enter a nuclear power plant and approach the storage of fuel elements. As a consequence, in 2018, Spautz was barred from participating in official inspections of the power plant.


Günter Heinrich is a German politician of the Christian Democratic Union (CDU) and Vice-President of the Saarland State Parliament. He has been an active member of the CDU since his youth and has held leading roles in local chapters of the party since 1974. Before being elected to be a member of the Saarland Landtag in 1999, he worked in the civil service of the city of Saarlouis for two decades. During that time he studied at the Saarland Academy of Administration and Economics and received a degree in 1989.





Jérôme Le Saint has been director at the Cattenom nuclear power plant since October 2020. Prior to that, he had been head of the production department at the site in Lorraine since 2017. Le Saint started his career in the automotive sector at Groupe PSA before moving to the French electricity group EdF in 2008. Le Saint has already worked for the company at several locations, including the Paris headquarters and the Chooz nuclear power plant in the Ardennes.

A Europe of the Regions? SaarLorLux as a role model for crossborder cooperation in the European Union

Subsidiarity is more than just the determination of the order at which governance level policy is conducted. Government and political action that takes local and regional perspectives into account generates acceptance and ownership by tshe local population. Thus, the preservation of subsidiarity is not only an interest in maintaining democracy close to the people, but also an important tool for coherence in border regions of the EU.



Jean-Louis Thill serves as Director for European Affairs and International Economic Relations at the Ministry of Foreign and European Affairs Luxembourg. He is a Luxembourgish diplomat and was, among other things, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg to the Republic of Serbia.



More than a Community of Nations: How the European Court of Justice watches over Europe's community of law

The EU as a community of law faces difficult challenges. Not only is the rule of law under threat in Poland and Hungary, national judicial bodies such as the German Federal Constitutional Court, which recently declared an EUCJ ruling on the permissibility of ECB bond purchases to be incompatible with the German Basic Law, challenge the sovereignty of the European judiciary. The EU is fighting back with the means at its disposal. The European Commission is initiating infringement procedures against member states in the east, supported by the Court of Justice as the core of the EU's judicial branch. This session discusses perspectives of the European judiciary and sets the framework of current challenges for Europe's community of law.

Juliane Kokott is one of eight Advocates General at the Court of Justice of the European Union. In this position she has been assisting the judges with her opinions in the interpretation of European law since 2003. Before that, she was a professor and head of the Institute for European Law, Public International Law and international business law at the University of St. Gallen in Switzerland. She has also taught at the Universities of Heidelberg, Mannheim, Augsburg and Düsseldorf, has been a visiting professor for the Law

of the European Communities at the University of California in Berkeley and worked at the Max Planck Institute for Comparative Public Law and International Law in Heidelberg. She studied law in Bonn, Geneva, and Washington D.C.

Politics, Reflection, and Music

In Berlin, the recent federal election and Angela Merkel's imminent departure loom large. For the past 16 years, Chancellor Merkel has been a figure of stability in international politics. But what, and who, will come next? On this last day of the study tour, fellows will have the opportunity to discuss among themselves, as well as reflect on their insights gained during the Richard von Weizsäcker Forum 2021 with Frank-Walter Steinmeier, Federal President of the Federal Republic of Germany.

The theme of borders will be taken up in a conversation with Daniel Barenboim, looking at the significance of cultural cooperation across borders.

Conversation with Federal President Frank-Walter Steinmeier

At this year's Richard von Weizsäcker Forum, fellows of the Robert Bosch Academy explored the implications of the 2021 federal and state elections on selected topics such as foreign policy, climate policy, the economy, and public opinion. Some of the topics addressed societal changes due to polarization and Germany's role in the changing international order. Fellows had the opportunity to discuss election programs and the impact of a future coalition agreement with representatives of political parties and journalists. During the tour to the SaarLorLux region, the fellows participated in a number of sessions dealing with the challenges facing the border region in the heart of Europe. Scheduled at the end of the Richard von Weizsäcker Forum 2021, this session will offer the opportunity to reflect on the insights gained over the course of the forum with Frank-Walter Steinmeier.



Frank-Walter Steinmeier is the twelfth President of the Federal Republic of Germany. His political career on the federal level started in 1998 when he was appointed State Secretary at the Federal Chancellery and Federal Government Commissioner for the Federal Intelligence Services under Chancellor Gerhard Schröder. He also served as Head of the Federal Chancellery from 1999. Under Chancellor Angela Merkel, Frank-Walter Steinmeier was appointed Federal Minister for Foreign Affairs in 2005 and was also

Deputy Chancellor from 2007. In 2009, he won a directly elected seat in a constituency in Land Brandenburg and became a Member of the German Bundestag. The parliamentary group of the Social Democratic Party of Germany in the German Bundestag elected him as chairperson. Four years later, he became Federal Minister for Foreign Affairs for the second time, and served in this role until January 2017. On 12 February 2017, Frank-Walter Steinmeier was elected as the twelfth President of the Federal Republic of Germany. As such, his functions as head of state traditionally include (1) representing the Federal Republic of Germany both at home and abroad (through public appearances at state, social and cultural events, speeches, visits to different Länder and communities in Germany, state visits abroad and as host to foreign dignitaries and state guests); and (2) representing the Federal Republic of Germany for the purposes of international law, concluding treaties with foreign states, accrediting (appointing) German envoys and receiving (receiving the letters of credence of) foreign envoys.

Entering the Post-Merkel Era: What to expect from Germany on the world stage

In 2005, the likes of Jacques Chirac, Wen Jiabao, Silvio Berlusconi, George W. Bush, Manmohan Singh, Fidel Castro, Ariel Sharon, Tony Blair, and Néstor Kirchner were the names of heads of state and government around the world. This was the world stage of international politics when Angela Merkel was elected to be chancellor of Germany for the first time. Now, 16 years later, she has outlasted those politicans and many more. Her successor enters a foreign policy arena that is, compared to 2005, not only dramatically different in terms of personnel, but also holds the greatest global challenges of our time. This session will discuss the outcome of the September 2021 election, the coalition talks, and their implications for the next German government on the world stage.





SaarLorLux: Laboratory for transborder cooperation in the heart of Europe

Tucked between Belgium, France, Germany, and Luxembourg is a small but unique region often described as a laboratory for economic and social cooperation within the EU. Since the original members are the German state of Saarland, the French Lorraine region, and the state of Luxembourg, it is to this day often referred to as SaarLorLux. This term was coined as a shorthand in 1969 by Hubertus Rolshoven, founding president of the Institut Régional Intracommunautaire and president of Saarberg, the former organization of coal mines in the Saarland. The term "Greater Region" is also commonly used as the geographical range of today's institutionalized crossborder cooperation includes not only the three original core regions, but also the German state Rhineland-Palatine and the Belgian region of Wallonia, the latter which is home to the French and German-speaking communities of Belgium.

The Greater Region covers 65,401 square kilometers in the heart of Western Europe and has around 11.6 million inhabitants. Saarbrücken, the capital of the Saarland, is the Greater Region's largest city with approximately 180,000 inhabitants, and center of a thriving, transborder metropolitan area. One of the Greater Region's characteristics is the high mobility of commuters: a quarter of a million of the region's inhabitants commute across a national border every day. A total of 197,000 people commute into Luxembourg alone, the smallest of the regions with 630,000 inhabitants. The Greater Region is therefore home to the highest number of transnational commuters anywhere in the EU.

For the Greater Region, the EU framework in which it is embedded is highly significant. Borders are open and almost unnoticeable, which facilitates everyday life and, of course, economic exchange. After the introduction of the Euro as a common currency in 1999/2002, monetary transactions between the four countries of the Greater Region became much easier. The Greater Region has also benefitted from the EU program INTERREG, through which projects promoting transborder economic and social cooperation in the region have received funding since 2007. And as Luxembourg is one of the EU's three institutional seats, the EU is also physically represented, and a significant pull-factor, in the Greater Region.

The Greater Region's economy used to be characterized by coalmines and steelworks, which is at the root of the common regional identity. In fact, the crisis of the coal and steel industries in the late 1960s marked the beginning of formal regional cooperation. In 1971, the governments of France, Germany, and Luxembourg established a regional commission to deal with the particular challenges of the SaarLorLux region. This commission was put on a legal foundation with the intergovernmental agreement on transnational cooperation (which included Rhineland-Palatine as a partner) in 1980. After European integration took a big step forward with the adoption of the Treaty of Maastricht in 1992, a high-level, recurring summit of the regional political executives was established to coordinate economic and social integration efforts in the now-called Greater Region. In 2005, the full membership of Wallonia with the French and German-speaking communities of Belgium was recognized.

Historically, in the 19th and 20th centuries, the region had been the center of border disputes and shifts Germany, for example, annexed Lorraine (and the neighboring region of Alsace) after the French-German war of 1870/1871. A second example is that, after World War II, the Saarland was occupied by France and later given constitutional autonomy. It was only politically reincorporated into West Germany in 1957 after 67 percent of the Saarland population voted for reunification with the Federal Republic.

Today, there are several bodies and organizations that structure and coordinate transborder cooperation. A summit of the executive leaders of all regions meets at least every two years and decides on strategic guidelines for cooperation. Despite the long history of cooperation, the population along the borders is not homogeneous. In addition to obvious differences in language, demographic divergences challenge the coherence of the border region. In 2019, the Greater Region had about 11.6 million inhabitants, most of them living in Rhineland-Palatinate (four million), Wallonia (3.6 million) and Lorraine (2.3 million). In contrast, Saarland (one million) and Luxembourg (630,000) make up only a small part of the population. In terms of demographic development, Luxembourg, Rhineland-Palatinate, and Wallonia have experienced above-average growth in the recent decades. Luxembourg, for example, has grown by 42 percent since 2000. Meanwhile, Lorraine's population numbers have stagnated; the Saarland's citizenry has been shrinking.

In 2019, the Greater Region's GDP was €416 billion (about three percent of EU GDP), and the unemployment rate was at 5.2 percent, which is lower than the European average, namely 6.3 percent. Again, there are regional divergences: Lorraine had an unemployment rate of 8.1 percent, while Rhineland-Palatinate had an unemployment rate of only 2.7 percent. In 2020, just like in many other places, the Greater Region's economy took a hit from the Covid-19 pandemic as GDP dropped by €400 billion.

However, it wasn't the economic losses that impacted the region the most but rather the international travel restrictions, which had immediate regional repercussions.

From March to May 2020, border traffic between the four countries of the Greater Region was more limited than it had been for decades. Higher infection rates in the neighboring regions prompted German decisionmakers on the federal level to close the borders. Even though this unilateral decision was heavily criticized, cooperation in other areas continued: for example, hospitals on the German side of the border took in Covid patients from overwhelmed French hospitals. The pandemic has thus cast a stark light on the challenges of everyday life, governance, and crossborder cooperation in the Greater Region. It has also emphasized how closely Lorraine, the Saarland, Wallonia, Rhineland-Palatinate, and Luxembourg have grown together and how important their common organization is to their success today – and in the future. It serves as laboratory of socio-economic and political cooperation within the EU, and showcases a regional identity among citizens, beyond the national or local


